"pseudepigrapha" which means "false writings," in the sense that a given book is attributed to someone who obviously did not write it eg Enoch, Baruch, Moses etc The apostle Paul refers to them as "Jewish fables" (Tit 1:14) And Peter refers to them as "cunningly devised fables" (2 Pet 1:16)
