3 "Trading post empire" and cartaz pass system: Unlike the Spanish annexation of large tracts of land in the Americas, the Portuguese only seized this string of ports, creating what is known as a "trading post empire" From these ports, they tried to create a monopoly by forcing merchants (at the barrel of a cannon) to buy a cartaz pass
