Augustine’s idea of sin as starting from the human moral evil of Adam's fall, but rejects its biological inheritance to all humans Augustine argues sin in the universal dimension of faith by which the will returns back to God, while Aquinas addresses it in the actual dimension of reason by

Original sin

Both Augustine and Anselm seem to be advancing the view that each of us is responsible for Adam's sin because each of us is identical to Adam. But this seems simply crazy. For one thing, it seems to imply (by the transitivity of identity) that each of us is identical to each other, and that there has been exactly one person with original sin.

A Heretic Reconsidered Pelagius, Augustine, And 'Original Sin'

, or the transmission of sin, which was a key element in a growing climate of determinism that was coming into being in the circles to which Pelagius had access. Augustine's formulation of a formal doctrine of original sin was highly deterministic, thus making original sin the central issue around which the Pelagian controversy revolved.

The Genesis of St. Augustine's Idea of Original Sin

Augustine identified with Adam, in his sin and in his condemnation. Original sin is then described as an infection which propagates itself from father to son through the act of generation, which being an act of organic trouble caused by the sin, is a sin itself and determines the transmission ipso facto of the sin to the new creature.

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very guilt of Adam's sin has been passed on to the entire race. It was Augustine who, in the course of the Pelagian controversy, first drew this conclusion from St. Paul's discussion of sin, particularly in the letter to the Romans. Augustine ultimately attributed the transmission to the agency of concupiscence, a less than happy solution.

AUGUSTINE: CONFESSIONS

Augustine was baptized by Ambrose at Milan during Eastertide, AD 387. A short time later his mother, Monica, died at Ostia on the journey back to Africa. A year later, Augustine was back in Roman Africa living in a monastery at Tagaste, his native town. In 391, he was ordained presbyter in the church of Hippo Regius (a small coastal town nearby).

Man as a Cause of Sin: The Transmission of Original Sin. Next we have to consider the cause of sin on the part of man. AUGUSTINE'S CHANGING THOUGHT ON SINLESSNESS ...

Augustine began his reply to the notion of the possibility of living a life free from sin in his text *De peccatorum meritis et remissione et De baptismo parvulorum*, probably written in 411/412, in response to a letter from Marcellinus. This letter, now lost, asked Augustine to
