Viajes por Bizancio y Occidente Jan 14 2021 El libro recoge una selección de artículos del autor publicados entre 1983 y 2007 que tratan

del trasvase de ideas desde el ámbito bizantino a Occidente desde distintas perspectivas. This work explores the contribution of major Latin American theologians to contemporary politics. Aguilar argues that within the Latin American context there has been a rediscovery of a fluid and sometimes contradictory relationship between the practice of religion and the practice of politics. For Christians in that context were forced to respond to a crisis in politics, whereby their own beliefs, practices, and way of life was pushed to the limit by human rights violations and absolutist forms of government. The Christian response was a confrontation against the state, the case of Chile, or a dissenting silence, the case of Argentina. In order to understand what became a Christian manifesto and the influence the pioneers of liberation theology has had on Christian action today one must depart from the well-known first period of Liberation theology - while acknowledging as all formative and seminal for discussions today and in the future.

Comparing these tablets with previously published documents, Gadotti and Kleinerman argue that elementary education in Mesopotamia was relatively standardized and that knowledge of cuneiform writing was more widespread than previously assumed. By refining our understanding of education in southern Mesopotamia, this volume elucidates more fully the pedagogical underpinnings of the world's first curriculum devised to teach a dead language. As a text edition, it will make these important documents accessible to Assyriologists and Sumerologists for future study.

El Moisés bíblico y el último rey de Mari Zimri-Lim son la misma persona May 18 2021 Basado en los siguientes paralelos, este libro afirma que el último rey de Mari Zimri-Lim (hijo adoptivo de Yahudin-Lim) y el bíblico Moisés son una misma persona: Entonces, Zimri-Lim, en su juventud, habiendo organizado una conspiración fallida contra Sumu-Jamam ((bibl.: supervisor del Faraón) - el gobernador de Shamshi-Adad (bibl.: Faraón el opresor) en Mari, huyó al vecino Yamhad (bibl. "al país de Madián") . Se casó allí con la nieta del rey Sumu-Epuh (bibl. Jethro) y vivió con ellos durante 20 años (1794-1774 aC). Tras la muerte de Shamshi-Adad, ascendió al trono de Mari con la ayuda de su suegro, Yarim-Lim I (bibl. Raguil), el heredero de Sumu-Epuh. Después de algún tiempo (en 1761 a. C.), Mari fue ocupada por el rey babilonio Hammurabi (bibl.: Faraón del Éxodo), a quien Zimri-Lim había llamado previamente su "|hermano mayor|" en toda su correspondencia diplomática, y fue también a su vez, habiendo cumplido con su deber fraterno, después de la ocupación, Mari no tocó a Zimri-Lim y lo dejó en el trono como su gobernador. Dado que las relaciones

de Zimri-Lim con el nuevo rey Yamhad, su cuñado (bibl. Hammurabi I), eran frías, no lo ayudó en este asunto (como está escrito en Números 10: 29-30). Bajo Zimri Lim en Mari, el ocultismo y la profecía estaban en su apogeo, y Zimri Lim no tomaría ninguna decisión sin el consejo de los oráculos. Sor Zimri-Lima Inibshina (bibl. Miriam) era viuda y sacerdotisa del Templo. La población de Mari se llamaba Chanitas (según su epónimo del rey asirio Khan), y se dividía en 2 grandes grupos: Binsimalites (hijos de la margen izquierda del Éufrates) y Binyaminitas (hijos de la margen derecha del Eufartes). Eufartes), cada uno de los cuales, a su vez, se dividió en varias tribus. El traslado de toda esta historia de Mari a Egipto ocurrió poco tiempo después de su asentamiento en Canaán, estas zonas fueron ocupadas por Egipto, y los judíos permanecieron bajo su yugo por varios cientos de años. Entonces toda la conciencia nacional de los judíos se puso en contra de Egipto, los profetas judíos, los líderes alimentaron este odio, vinculando todas las viejas heridas de los judíos con Egipto. También hubo una mezcla de estos 2 Canaán - Mesopotamia ("Reino de Khana") con la palestina. El panteón de deidades de ambos cananeos (primeros israelitas y Mari) también coincide.

The Language of Colour in the Bible Jul 28 2019 The Bible is one of the books that has aroused the most interest throughout history to the present day. However, there is one topic that has mostly been neglected and which today constitutes one of the most emblematic elements of the visual culture in which we live immersed: the language of colour. Colour is present in the biblical text from its beginning to its end, but it has hardly been studied, and we appear to have forgotten that the detailed study of the colour terms in the Bible is essential to understanding the use and symbolism that the language of colour has acquired in the literature that has forged European culture and art. The objective of the present study is to provide the modern reader with the meaning of colour terms of the lexical families related to the green tonality in order to determine whether they denote only color and, if so, what is the coloration expressed, or whether, together with the chromatic denotation, another reality inseparable from colour underlies/along with the chromatic denotation, there is another underlying reality that is inseparable from colour. We will study the symbolism that/which underpins some of these colour terms, and which European culture has inherited. This lexicographical study requires a methodology that allows us to approach colour not in accordance with our modern and abstract concept of colour, but with the concept of the ancient civilisations. This is why the concept of colour that emerges from each of the versions of the Bible is studied and compared with that found in theoretical reflection in both Greek and Latin. Colour thus emerges as a concrete reality, visible

on the surface of objects, reflecting in many cases, not an intrinsic quality, but their state. This concept has a reflection in the biblical languages, since the terms of colour always describe an entity (in this sense one can say that they are embodied) and include within them a wide chromatic spectrum, that is, they are mostly polysemic. Structuralism through the componential analysis, although providing interesting contributions, had at the same time serious shortcomings when it came to the study of colour. These were addressed through the theoretical framework provided by cognitive linguistics and some of its tools such as: cognitive domains, metonymy and metaphor. Our study, then, is one of the first to apply some of the contributions of cognitive linguistics to lexicography in general, and particularly with reference to the Hebrew, Greek and Latin versions of the Bible. A further novel contribution of this research is that the meaning is expressed through a definition and not through a list of possible colour terms as happens in dictionaries or in studies referring to colour in antiquity. The definition allows us to delve deeper and discover new nuances that enrich the understanding of colour in the three great civilizations involved in our study: Israel, Greece and Rome.
